SELF CONCEPT FROM CULTURE ASPECT

- Culture helps define how individuals see themselves and how they relate to others. ... A family's cultural values shape the development of its child's self-concept: Culture shapes how we each see ourselves and others. For example, some cultures prefer children to be quiet and respectful when around adults.
- How we see ourselves shapes our lives, and is shaped by our cultural context. Self-perceptions influence, among other things, how we think about the world, our social relationships, health and lifestyle choices, community engagement, political actions, and ultimately our own and other people's well-being.

- Self concept refers to all understanding and knowledge of oneself. The components of self concepts include: psychological, physical and social attitudes, ideas and beliefs that one has. The most influence in terms of self concept is family's history, basically referring to the culture one has been brought up in, and the experiences he or she has undergone.

SELF CONCEPT AND RELIGION ASPECT

Depending on where you live, religion may also make you feel better about yourself by making you feel part of your larger culture. People who are religious have higher self-esteem and better psychological adjustment than people who aren't.

Religious practice promotes the well-being of individuals, families, and the community. ... Religious worship also leads to a reduction in the incidence of domestic abuse, crime, substance abuse, and addiction. In addition, religious practice can increase physical and mental health, longevity, and education attainment.

Self concept and Gender Aspect

- A stereotypic pattern of gender differences has been found in previous self-concept research. Men have tended to rate themselves higher on self-concept measures of giftedness, power, and invulnerability, and women have rated themselves higher on selfconcept measures of likability and morality.
- Gender identity is defined as a personal conception of oneself as male or female (or rarely, both or neither). This concept is intimately related to the concept of gender role, which is defined as the outward manifestations of personality that reflect the gender identity.

 Gender roles influence adolescents' self-esteem. ... During adolescence, girls appear to be more vulnerable than boys) to the negative psychological health effects of stress; they present significantly higher levels of adaptation, depressive symptomatology and eating disorders.

- social class plays an important role in structuring the self-concept, and that researchers should pay more attention to the importance of social class to self and identity processes.
- Social and economic factors, such as income, education, employment, community safety, and social supports can significantly affect how well and how long we live. ... For example, employment provides income that shapes choices about housing, education, child care, food, medical care, and more.
